

This fund is focused on maximizing total return potential while preserving principal for Canadian fixed income investors. Unlike funds that simply seek the highest yield, this fund aims to provide investors with a combination of income, capital appreciation and capital preservation potential.

- Quality, diversification, flexibility The fund emphasizes higher quality, intermediate-term bonds and aims to avoid concentrated risk exposure by being diversified across the fixed income opportunity set. Its flexibility to respond to changing economic conditions helps it manage overall risk and increase total return potential.
- An established investment process The fund's portfolio positioning and security selection are guided by PIMCO's time-tested investment process: our rigorously developed macro outlook, bottom-up credit analysis and our research teams' deep reservoir of specialized investment expertise.
- A risk-focused approach The fund's total return approach, a concept pioneered by PIMCO, seeks to protect principal rather than simply reaching for the highest yields. In addition to employing sophisticated risk controls, the fund also benefits from the firm's efforts to identify major market risks early and position portfolios accordingly.

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Duration is a measure of a portfolio's price sensitivity expressed in years.

The Sharpe Ratio measures the risk-adjusted performance. The risk-free rate is subtracted from the rate of return for a portfolio and the result is divided by the standard deviation of the portfolio returns.

Volatility is measured by the standard deviation, or dispersion of a set of data from its mean, based on historical portfolio returns. A larger spread of data indicates higher standard deviation and higher volatility.

Effective maturity is a weighted average of all the maturities of the bonds in a portfolio, computed by weighting each bonds effective maturity by the market value of the security. FTSE Canada Universe Bond Index is designed to be a broad measure of the Canadian investment-grade fixed income market. Returns are calculated daily, and are weighted by market capitalization, so that the return on a bond influences the return on the index in proportion to the bonds market value. It is intended to be a transparent index, with individual security holdings disclosed electronically each day. The Universe Index is divided into a variety of sub-indexes according to term and credit. The main term subsectors are Short, Mid, and Long. There are four main credit or borrower categories: bonds issued by the Government of Canada (including Crown Corporations), Provincial bonds (including provincially-guaranteed securities), Municipal Bonds, and Corporate Bonds. The Corporate sector is further divided into sub-sectors based on credit rating: a combined AAA/AA sector, a single-A sector, and a BBB sector.
